

BRITISH VALUES STATEMENT

At Hadleigh Infants and Nursery School we take very seriously our responsibility to prepare even our young children for life in Modern Britain. We value the ethnic backgrounds of all pupils and families and undertake a variety of events and lessons to celebrate and explore these alongside other cultures in our country.

We ensure that the fundamental British Values are introduced, discussed and lived out through the ethos and work of the school. All curriculum areas provide a vehicle for furthering understanding of these concepts. Our cross-curricular approach provides excellent opportunities to deepen and expand understanding developing the spiritual, moral, social and cultural education of our children.

The school makes considerable efforts to ensure children have exposure to a wide experience beyond their local community during which these concepts are shown through, for example, sporting events, a range of visits and supporting a child's schooling in Uganda. Our emphasis on a values based positive outlook gives the children an excellent platform for embracing and celebrating differences.

At Hadleigh Infants and Nursery School we value the voice of the child and promote democratic processes such as our School Council and Eco Warriors who the children select by ballot. Although our children are young we take every opportunity to promote debate and putting forward points of view.

The older children are encouraged to look after the younger children and ensure they are fully involved in all aspects of school life. We expect all our children to be good role models for each other, which is encouraged through high expectations of behaviour.
